Honoring American Judaism and Standing with Israel By David Lederman, President, Sons of Jacob Synagogue Kol Nidre speech, October 11, 2024

Good Yuntif.

As we enter this holy night of remembrance, I want to reflect on our history as a synagogue and as a small, vibrant Jewish community.

I feel humbled when I remember the remarkable accomplishments of those who came before me, the long line of distinguished leaders since Jacob Cohn served as our first president after Sons of Jacob was founded in 1905.

I am grateful that several of our past presidents, many of whom have served multiple terms, have been able to join us during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur this year.

Thank you past presidents Dr. Ted Lederman, Henry Maidan, Bobbi Kazenelson, Sarah Stokes, and Dr. Judy Finkelstein, for your long-term devotion to our synagogue and innovative leadership. You are my mentors.

This has been an extremely painful year for Jews.

Our High Holidays are taking place a year after one of the grimmest anniversaries in Jewish history, the October 7, 2023 day during which thousands of Hamas terrorists invaded Israel, massacring almost 1,200 people and kidnapping 250 more in a barbarous attack that has sparked a year of war on multiple fronts.

Our community stands with Israel and the families who have been affected by the taking of hostages and war.

The last year also saw the largest recorded number of antisemitic incidents in the US since the Anti-Defamation League began keeping track in 1979.

We at Sons of Jacob abhor antisemitism and stand up for freedom of religion.

More than ever, we support the right of Jews everywhere to practice our faith, defend our rights, and to live free and in peace.

As practicing Jews, we understand where we come from.

While growing up, we learned that Jews have had a long history of facing prejudice, of not always being welcomed or accepted.

This has inspired many of us to do the opposite, to help others and to be kind and welcoming.

As Jewish people, we come from many places and have diverse backgrounds. We have faced many challenges on our journey to becoming a free people with our own land, Israel.

We are here tonight because of the wisdom and courage of those Jews who came before us and because we cherish Israel and our rights as American Jews.

Tonight, we are free to practice our Jewish faith and keep our covenant with God as the chosen people. Every year, we build on this commitment to our faith, history, and traditions.

This year, we have started several new traditions to become a more welcoming space for Cedar Valley Jews.

We have held three well-received, summer shabbat services at members' homes.

We have provided assistance to our seniors, including providing rides to services and socializing on game days.

Shirley Davis, our administrative assistant, reaches out to everyone with dedication and empathy. Shirley plays a key role in the oral history project.

We have welcomed five new synagogue members to Sons of Jacob since our last annual meeting.

We have celebrated local Jewish history by visiting the award-winning Cedar Falls exhibit on the famous Rosenthal vaudeville family and by attending additional programs on Lew Rosenthal's music and theatrical contributions.

We have heard first-hand from synagogue members, Sarah Cohen and Jacob Lederman, about their volunteer work in Israel since the October 7th Hamas terror attack and how all of us can help.

We are a resilient, creative, Jewish community with remarkably rich programming despite our small size!

We all work hard to make Sons of Jacob a special place we can all call home.

I am grateful to our capable Board of Directors: Laura Praglin, Ira Fratrik, Naomi McCormick, and Jacqui Herrick for your wise counsel and hard work.

I also want to thank the Long Term Planning Committee, chaired by Naomi McCormick, which includes Andrea Fratrik, Bobbi Kazenelson, Laura Praglin, Noah Levine, CEO of the Jewish Community Legacy Project, and most recently, David Duke as well as myself. This committee helps Sons of Jacob remain sustainable.

We are blessed to have Rabbi Rebecca Kushner lead our services most of the year and to have Rabbi Ora Schnitzer lead us in worship during the High Holidays and beyond.

Tonight, we also remember our loved ones of blessed memory who continue to have a positive impact on our lives as Jews and Americans. We build on their legacy.

Our journey is not over, and we will go into the new year together praying for the safe release of all remaining hostages, for an end to war, for increased security for our beloved Israel, and for lasting peace in the middle east and throughout the world.

The most recent introduction to the hobby farm has been quite a learning experience. The bees joined us just last spring and have already provided us with more than six quarts of the most delicious honey you could ever taste. So, we are halfway to creating a land flowing with milk and honey! The bees have been a journey of learning that I expect to continue for many seasons to come. As I've watched these fascinating creatures it struck me how much they remind me of the Israelites.

 Bees are highly organized and cooperative. They work together for the benefit of the hive. The Israelites too, are often described as a united people. The Torah frequently emphasized the importance of unity, mutual responsibility and communal worship. There is no doubt that there is a strong bond within the people of Israel.







• Even though bees are given a bad rap, they are peaceful when left alone. However, they will fiercely defend their hive when threatened, using collective strength to repel attackers. I don't need to point out the ways in which the Israelites have been called on to defend their land and lives throughout time and place.

- Bees are productive and life-giving. The honey they produce is a symbol of sweetness and abundance, but they also are crucial pollinators, giving life to plants, crops and in turn animals and humans. The Israelites too were intended to be a "light unto the nations" (Isaiah 49:6). Their productivity was not only in physical terms but also in terms of cultivating a just and moral society.
- My hive produced over 10 pounds of honey this summer. Did you know that to make just one pound of honey, a hive's worker bees must fly 55,000 miles and visit around two million flowers? Just for one pound! So now you know what they mean when they say, "busy as a bee." Bees are tireless workers. Their diligence and perseverance are essential to their survival and success. The Torah too emphasizes the importance of hard work. In Genesis Adam is told "in toil shalt thou eat...in the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread." Like bees the Israelites survival as a people depended on their steadfastness.





The Talmud teaches us that Adonai picks each one of us up "ba'asher hu sham," where we are at any given moment. We describe the Holy One with the poetic "ha-Makom," the Place. Wherever we are, no matter into which ditch we may have slid, Adonai shares our road with us. The Yom Kippur liturgy assures us of the promise: "I have forgiven you, according to your plea."



Reb Zalman z"l inspired me to think of Adonai as a dear friend sitting on the passenger seat beside me when I drive; a friend that both corrects and counsels, just as the High Holiday liturgy describes. I can always talk to this holy friend beside me: I can ask for directions, complain about detours, and perhaps even take time for prayer in a cul-de-sac. CEDAR FALLS, IA - John McCormick is back at Hartman Reserve Nature Center as the next 2nd Sunday Speaker. November 10, at 2:00 PM in the Community Room. John will be sharing photos of his recent trip to Costa Rica, one of the most biodiverse countries in the world, with more than 250 species of mammals and over 920 species of birds. Remarkably. Costa Rica has protected 28% of its land in national parks, reserves, and wildlife refuges. It is also the only country in the world that generates more than 99% of its electricity from renewable sources. John McCormick and his wife, Naomi, saw only a fraction of the Costa Rican wildlife during their three-week visit. John could not resist taking over 5,000 photographs, but he somehow whittled it down to an hour's worth of his favorite images and the stories behind them. There is no cost to attend this program and no registration is required.

The main entrance for Hartman Reserve is at 657 Reserve Drive in Cedar Falls. Currently there is road construction on Timber Drive, so attendees will need to approach the entrance from the west via Edwards Avenue. The 2nd Sunday Speaker Series usually occurs on the 2nd Sunday of each month. Speakers present on topics related to nature and our environment.
